This course also details how cheaper energy, better local transport, cheaper running costs of cars, and cheaper forms of food can reduce the cost of living – vital in today's economy.

This course covers:

- 1. The basic science behind extreme weather and the impact of floods, famine, and drought on our communities.
- 2. The legal targets you need to meet.
- 3. Examples of best practices from other councils, provided by NALC, and the benefits they will bring.
- 4. Funding for projects
- 5. What actions you will take.
- 6. How to communicate "sustainability" to your community to get their engagement.
